
Norfolk Naval Shipyard (NNSY) History

America's first commissioned submarine operated from NNSY

Thanks to **President Theodore Roosevelt**, a visionary in his time, the United States Navy bought its **first submarine** on April 11, 1900, when he was Secretary of Navy.

It was home ported some of its time at U.S. Navy Yard, Norfolk, Virginia, the forerunner of Norfolk Naval Shipyard during its five-year operational life at the turn of the Twentieth Century. (The Navy commissioned this first submarine, *USS Holland*, a day after purchasing it,

and put it into service the following day.) Until that time the person who became known as the father of the nation's submarine program, John Phillip Holland, an Irishman born in 1840, had faced several rejections by the Navy for his various proposals and designs for submersibles. But Holland persevered and his ideas were proven in the Navy's first submersible. The Navy accepted his competitive submarine design and paid Holland \$150,000 for it.

Some of his submarine patents were included in some form through two world wars and still continue to modern times.

The *USS Holland* (SS 1) was built at the Crescent Shipyard in Elizabeth, New Jersey. It was nearly 54 feet long, had a beam of nearly 11 feet and had a crew of one officer and six enlisted Sailors. It used a gasoline engine on the surface and electric batteries when submerged. It also had one 18-inch torpedo tube and operated at a speed of six knots.

On August 25, 1905, in Teddy Roosevelt's typical swashbuckling style, he became the first American President to stay submerged on a U.S. submarine. He did this for nearly an hour aboard *USS Holland*. And following successful rigorous tests, the Navy ordered six more of Holland's submarines.

In addition to other deployments, the *Holland* became a training vessel at the Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland.

The Holland further proved itself when it traveled on the surface 166 miles from Annapolis to the earlier Norfolk Naval Shipyard, while collecting useful performance data along the way.

The *Holland* was struck from the Navy Register of Ships on November 10, 1910.

It was displayed in a Patterson, New Jersey, park until 1932, when it was sold for scrap for \$100 to the Henry A. Hitner & Sons company in Philadelphia. The purchaser had to post a \$5,000 bond to assure that

the Holland would be broken up and never again used as a vessel. Our Navy had operated two earlier submarines that weren't commissioned—Alligator (1862-63) and Intelligent Whale (1869-73).

With Britain's Royal Navy's approval, there was an agreement in 1900 between the Electric Boat Company in the United States and the English company, Vickers Sons & Maxim Limited, to build five Holland-class submarines using Electric Boat patents.

The first British vessel, *HMS Holland* 1, was launched on October 2, 1901,

and arrived in Portsmouth, England, where it suffered an unexplained explosion that injured four crewmen.

After a decade in service, HMS

In 1981, HMS Holland 1 was found and it is currently displayed in a climate-controlled building at the Royal Navy's Submarine Museum in Gosport, England. (When NNSY's original shipyard opened in 1767, it




This sculpture of submarine pioneer Holland is located in the **John P. Holland Centre in County Clare, Ireland**. Museum photo

was named after its English counterpart.) On April 11, 2024, NNSY observed the 124th anniversary of the original Holland submarine.

Holland 1 was decommissioned in 1913, and sold for scrap. But it was lost on the way in the sea while under

tow, near the Cornish Coast. Fortunately, *HMS Holland I* was unmanned at the time.

This contributed to a record attendance of 70 people entering the Police Administration auditorium at the Portsmouth Welcome Center to hear about the "Secrets of the Norfolk Naval Shipyard (NNSY)".

And who better to tell the secrets than the current, and 111th, Commanding Officer of the Shipyard, Captain James P. "Jip"

Mosman. Captain Mosman was well introduced by the 100th Commanding Officer of NNSY,



City Councilman, Rear Adm (Ret) Mark Hugel. Captain Mosman told about not only the extraordinary history of the shipyard, but also emphasized the present modernization projects to make

NNSY the shipyard of the future. The Shipyard takes great pride in the well trained and diversified workforce with the capabilities to work on any Navy ship, at any time, and at anywhere.

The Shipyard historian and archivist, Marcus Robbins, assisted



the shipyard Commander, by showing some of the oldest maps and photos of the Shipyard, formerly Gosport Navy Yard. Attendees even got to hold a piece of the granite from the historical



graving dock, Dry Dock #1, the oldest operational dry dock in the United States. Many other "secrets" of the Shipyard were shared including: the building of the first battleship, USS Texas; the conversion of the collier, USS Jupiter, into the first aircraft carrier, USS Langley; preparations for the departure of the Great White Fleet from NNSY; the building of a



German Village within the Shipyard during WW1; and the story of the oldest surviving building within NNSY, the Tar House.

What a treat!
