


President's Message

NNSY History



Noted Author worked briefly at **NNSY during World War II** While reading a book recently about world-famous author Joseph Heller, I was surprised to learn he had worked briefly at Norfolk Naval Shipyard during World War II, before going into the military. This information is contained on page 16, in a one-sentence mention in the 1991 book titled "Joseph Heller," by Judith Ruderman. After the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941, Heller worked as a Blacksmith Shop helper for a short time at the Norfolk Navy Yard, as it was known then. It was renamed Norfolk Naval Shipyard on Dec. 1, 1945, four months after the war ended. Heller was 19 when he enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Corps and spent three years in the



John Quarstein – Gosport Shipyard Presentation

Noted Historian, John Quarstein, presented a fascinating lecture at the Portsmouth Public Library in Churchland on March 23, 2022 at 6 pm. He was his usual engaging, entertaining and informative self as he laid out the history of the Gosport Navy Yard from its founding as the Gosport Shipyard in 1767 by Andrew Sprowle, a British Loyalist, through its occupation by the British in 1775,

- past the retaking of the Yard by the Virginian troops in 1776,
- and the burning of the Yard by the British in 1779,
- to its annexation to Portsmouth in 1784,
- its leasing to the fledgling US Navy in 1795,
- its purchase by the Navy in 1801 for \$12,000,
- to the opening in 1833 of the 1st Drydock in the Americas,
- through the burning and loss of the Yard to the Confederacy in 1861,
- and its recapture in 1862 and beyond.

You just had to be there.
